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The Beaverton Area Chamber urges the Oregon Legislature, Metro, Washington County, City of Beaverton and each Washington County-area Chamber of Commerce to consider and coordinate with our guiding principles and engage our members in policy conversations and decisions in 2023.

WHO WE ARE

The Beaverton Chamber is the independent, significant voice of the Beaverton area's growing business community, which is considered a significant part of the economic engine of Oregon. We are a member-driven organization, proud to represent and serve more than 6,000 small businesses, large employers and nonprofits operating in the Beaverton area, ranging from local restaurants and auto repair shops to the world leader of sports apparel. The businesses we represent are make Beaverton an economically prosperous, safe, healthy, inclusive and innovative place to live, work and play.

OUR LEGISLATIVE AND POLICY FOCUS

The Business Advocacy Council actively monitors and participates in legislation activation, policy review and efforts and initiatives that may cause commercial impact locally, regionally and at the federal level. We ask our representatives at the state legislature, city, county, regional bodies and Congress to <u>do no harm</u>. We are asking policymakers and officials to contemplate very seriously any action, be it regulatory enactment, tax incursion or fee increases, and to view any action through the lens of a Main Street business owner who has finally gotten over the difficulties caused by Covid only to see the possibility of a looming economic downturn. Any additional burden on our beleaguered businesses will result in a catastrophic loss of businesses throughout our communities, who will be unable to continue absorbing additional costs with reduced capacity and severe curtailment in their customer base. During this ongoing recovery, our businesses have yet to absorb all of the new fees/taxes already passed so we respectfully ask for a pause on new taxes and fees while we all collectively recover. We will also be advocating for more workforce training programs to create a deeper pool of potential employees for local business. Lastly, we will continue to help local businesses and organizations coordinate with governments and non-profits to tackle the houselessness in Beaverton.

	with badly needed investments resulting in an increase in local spending and through federal		
	infrastructure investments.
